## Campus Update - Tues., 7:22 a.m., Sept. 15

We are experiencing light winds and rain bands this morning, while lightning occasionally flashes in the distance. It's pretty quiet here now.

Although Sally is lurking just miles from the Mississippi River's mouth, forecasters are having difficulty pinpointing the time and place the storm will hit land because it's crawling along at only 2 mph.
