## Campus Update – Weds., 7:20 a.m., Sept. 16

Though we are grateful that Hurricane Sally shifted east and avoided Mobile, our thoughts are with those in Gulf Shores, Orange Beach, Pensacola, and the other areas being hammered by the storm.

Sally, a storm that has defied forecasters for days, made landfall this morning near Orange Beach, Alabama, at around 5 a.m as a category 2 hurricane.

Here on the ASMS campus, we are still experiencing 50-60 mph wind gusts and sideways rain. The worst weather passed through at around 5:30 a.m., but conditions are still rough outside. Lastly, I would like to thank you for entrusting us with your precious students during a major hurricane. They approached the storm with maturity and calmness. The hall staff has also done an outstanding job of remaining calm and vigilant during the past three days.
